

MY SOLO EXPERIENCE

Well I definitely had an interesting solo experience ... I'll start with the night before. Heather (my instructor) and I went up and she was really impressed with my landings and "stuff" but it was really windy and gusty and although I handled it well, we decided to do the solo in the morning.

6:00 the next morning we showed up and got going and did a few landings before some small clouds in the approach area were forcing me to make a tighter pattern, so we landed and waited on them to clear up. Once they cleared up I was out to do my solo.

Now that whole time we were doing a left pattern going one way on the runway, when I contacted ground and asked for taxi they told me the other end of the runway and a right pattern. So I went and took off and everything was fine except a blanket of clouds at that end I was taking off from now. Going the other way we were climbing over them before we got there and it wasn't a problem, but since they changed runway direction on me I had to fly high over them during approach and right before I got to the runway I dropped full flaps and put it in a pretty good slip and dropped it over the edge of the clouds to the runway. It all worked out well but I didn't do the other two right then because the clouds/fog was just making their way over the end of the runway. Later we decided it was clear enough and I was going to finish up the other two landings.

It was quite gusty again and the airport was really busy but I figured I could handle it. The first one went perfect, no problem. The second one I was told right after takeoff to squawk VFR but I couldn't hear them



clearly so I asked for it again, this time I heard just fine but I had always been told the actual number to put in the transponder so that caught the me off guard. My very "professional" radio call went something like "six two echo I heard you fine this time ... I still have no clue what that means." — They figured out my problem and told me the number to put in then.

Other than that, everything went well, I wasn't nervous at all and it really wasn't any different than before, just fly the plane, tell the tower what you are doing, and make "stupid" radio calls that they just laugh about ... like I always do when I'm thrown something new. Soloing has definitely been one of the best experiences I've ever had; now I can't wait to get my license!

AVIATION QUESTION OF THE MONTH

Answer to last month's question: I am not an A&P mechanic. Can I legally make and use my own part (so I don't have to buy the part) for my certified airplane no matter what age the plane is?

According to the FAA: Yes! In 14 CFR Part 21 the FAA writes the requirements. SEE ESPECIALLY:§43.2 (b) No person may describe in any required maintenance entry or form an aircraft, airframe, aircraft engine, propeller, appliance, or component part as being rebuilt unless it has been disassembled, cleaned, inspected, repaired as necessary, reassembled, and tested to the same tolerances and limits as a new item, using either new parts or used parts that either conform to new part tolerances and limits or to approved oversized or undersized dimensions. In addition, Advisory Circular 20-62E spells out the procedure for how owners can make their own parts for the aircraft they own.

This Month's Question: I hold a commercial pilot certificate with rotorcraft and instrument ratings, but I don't have any airplane time. How many hours would I need to add an airplane single-engine land rating at the private level?

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EAA AIRVENTURE® OSHKOSH



As club president Al Nodorft exclaimed on the first page of this newsletter, AirVenture[®] Oshkosh was record-setting. EAA AirVenture[®] Oshkosh took place July 24 to July 30, 2017 at Wittman Regional Airport in Oshkosh, Wisconsin (KOSH).

Information from EAA CEO and Chairman Jack J. Pelton:

– Attendance: Approximately 590,000, an increase of five percent over 2016.

- Total aircraft: More than 10,000 aircraft arrived at Wittman Regional Airport in Oshkosh and other airports in east-central Wisconsin. At Wittman alone, there were 17,223 aircraft

operations in the 10-day period from July 21-30, which is an average of approximately 123 takeoffs/landings per hour.

- Total showplanes: 2,991 (up 5 percent over 2016): 1,107 homebuilt aircraft (second straight year over 1,100), 1,162 vintage airplanes (up 12 percent), 351 warbirds, 168 ultralights and light-sport aircraft, 79 seaplanes, 54 rotorcraft, 60 aerobatic aircraft, and 10 hot air balloons.
- Camping: More than 11,600 sites in aircraft and drive-in camping accounted for an estimated 40,000 visitors throughout the week.
- Commercial exhibitors: 881.
- Forums and Workshops: A total of 1,050 sessions attended by more than 75,000 people.
- Guests registered at International Visitors Tent: A record 2,527 visitors registered from a record-tying 80 nations. (Additional unregistered international visitor counts push the total higher.) Top countries represented by registered visitors: Canada (583 visitors), Australia (346), and South Africa (204).
- More than 11,600 sites in aircraft and drive-in camping accounted for an estimated 40,000 visitors throughout the week, according to EAA officials..

Pelton attributed the record attendance figure to what EAA was able to offer attendees this year, and the beautiful weather. He said staff will begin work Monday, preparing to make EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2018 even better than 2017. Next year's show is slated for July 23-29, 2018.

NAME THAT PLANE

Swallow biplane

Those who visited the 2017 EAA Airventure may have seen the Swallow biplane flying there during the event. One mile from the Airventure site, the Swallow flies out of EAA's Pioneer Airport, where visitors can personally experience a flight in this important part of aviation history. In 1927 the Swallow Airplane Manufacturing Co. of Wichita published an ad claiming to be the "oldest manufacturer of commercial airplanes in America." This could be true, as from 1924 through 1929 the company was one of the country's leading builders of general aviation airplanes. Swallow was, in fact, the pioneer builder of the post-World War I generation of private aircraft and introduced many new features that soon became industry standards. It was a simple and rugged biplane design with room for an instructor and student in tandem open cockpits. A third seat was added in some variations. The fuselage was made from welded steel tubing, faired to shape and then fabric covered. The wings were typical of the day with Spruce spars, spruce & plywood ribs with fabric covering. The Swallow airplane became the first really successful commercial aircraft built in America, with nearly 600 produced. Engineer and designer Matty Laird created the first Swallow in 1920 and formed an aircraft company in Wichita, Kansas. He ran the company for three years, then sold it and became renowned for his racing aircraft designs. The new officers of the Swallow Aircraft Company included Lloyd Stearman and Walter Beech, who later formed their own aircraft companies. In 1924, Stearman introduced the New Swallow, which became an almost instant success. His brother Waverly Stearman added further refinements, creating the Swallow model that was built during 1927 and 1928. EAA's Swallow is this later design, bearing serial number 899. At a price of \$2,485 in 1927, Swallow airplanes were very popular and helped support a new industry: air mail. The aircraft on the masthead was donated to EAA in 1976 by John H. McGeary Jr. and remained in storage for many years. A restoration process was started in 2001 under the leadership of Gary Buettner. The project received generous support from the United Airlines Historical Society, Clay Lacy, Stits Poly-Fiber and others. It took to the air again in 2004, test flown by Buck Hilbert, and is now powered by a 220-hp Continental radial, a significant upgrade from the original 90-hp OX-5 engine.
